Luke 3:1-6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. We remember Jesus who touched lepers and the sick and feasted with tax collectors and sinners. We remember Christ who lives on in all who courageously and faithfully bring forth the light of your love in earth's darkest places.

We remember Jesus who, on the night before he died, shared a meal with his friends. He took bread, blessed it and broke it and gave it to them saying:

All ""Take and eat. This is my own body given for you. Do this to remember me."

Presider After supper he took a cup of wine, gave thanks and gave it to them saying:

All "This is my life-blood given for you. Do this to remember me."

Presider So we proclaim the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Presider O God who is known to us in human flesh, send your Holy Spirit on us and on these material things of bread and wine, that they may be for us the body and blood of Christ, and we may be the body of Christ, food and life for the world. We ask these things through Christ, with whom and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit be glory now and forever. **Amen.**


Cookie Walk Returns December 21!!!!

Our sixth annual Cookie Walk is December 21, 2024 from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon, and we are recruiting volunteers. We need many bakers - - the more bakers we have, the greater the variety!! We also need volunteers to help with set up, sales and/or cleanup. And, of course, financial contributions towards costs or to support the event are always appreciated.

Here are some details:

- · Cookies. For this event, we only sell homemade baked cookies - no cakes, pies or other baked goods. Cookies should be dropped off in a sealed container - e.g., a zip lock freezer bag - and should include a card with your name, the kind of cookie, and an ingredient list. The cookies should be loose in the container, i.e., not pre-packaged in baggies. In addition to regular homemade cookies, we also sell gluten-free cookies and dog cookies. So, if the latter are a specialty of yours, you might consider baking them.
- Drop off. Drop off for the cookies at the church is anytime Friday, December 20 before 8:00 PM. There will be a green bin in the cloister area where you can leave the cookies. If this time slot doesn't work, you can email the Fundraising Committee to make special arrangements.
- Other volunteers. We need volunteers for set-up, sales, and clean-up on Saturday, December 21. Please let the Fundraising Committee know if you can bake or otherwise volunteer in some way. The Fundraising Committee hopes to put together a list of volunteers soon. You can also contact us with any questions.
